Interest On Trust Accounts

On Tuesday, June 2, 1981, at 9:30 a.m., The Supreme Court of Florida will hear oral argument on Petition to Modify the Interest on Trust Accounts Program. The Petition is presented by The Florida Bar Foundation, Inc., and joined in by The Florida Bar.

If adopted by the court, the modification would eliminate the non-interest bearing trust account. Trust deposits which are small in amount or to be held for a short period of time would be deposited in a commingled interest bearing account (Now Account). The interest earned on the total amount in such account would be remitted to The Florida Bar Foundation. The Foundation would use the money for legal aid to the poor, student loans, and programs to improve the administration of justice. Administrative costs would be borne by the Foundation. Trust deposits of significant amounts or held for a long period of time would be deposited in a separate account with interest to be remitted to the client.

On Friday, May 29, 1981, the Executive Committee of The Broward County Bar Association adopted a resolution opposing the amendment to the Integration Rule of the Florida Bar Rule 11.02 (4) that requires the establishment of interest bearing trust accounts with interest to be paid directly to the Florida Bar Foundation until more time and notice can be given to members of the Bar and to the public.

11th Circuit will be in Atlanta, Georgia, and oral arguments for the 11th Circuit will initially be held in Atlanta, Montgomery, Alabama, Jacksonville and Miami, Florida.

Attorneys who are presently admitted to practice before the 5th Circuit will be admitted to practice before the 11th Circuit upon payment of the sum of \$5.00 and by making application in a letter to the Clerk of the 5th Circuit, 600 Camp Street, New Orleans, Louisiana 70130, wherein he certifies that he is a member in good standing of the Bar of the 5th Circuit and requests to be admitted to the 11th Circuit, setting forth his Social Security number and including the check for the fee. This must be done by December 31st, 1981.

If the attorney wishes to be admitted to both new Circuits, then he should send a check for the total sum of \$25.00 with his letter to the Clerk of the 5th Circuit.

Nova Law Library **Announces** Services For Attorneys

The Nova Law Library announces two new services for members of the Bar. A telephone photocopy service and a telephone reference service are now available.

The photocopy service is designed to save attorneys' time and travel in order to obtain the research material they need. Now all attorneys associated with firms can call the Law Library and place their orders by telephone. The material will be copied, billed and mailed to the firm. Orders can be picked up at the Circulation Desk, if necessary. The cost of the service is 25 cents per page. Minimum mailing and billing charge is \$2.00 plus postage. To place a photocopy order call (305) 522-2300.

The expanded reference service offers attorneys "in person" and "telephone assistance" from professional law librarians. A reference desk is now staffed from 8:30 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. Monday through Friday. Experienced librarians will offer instruction in the use of the library and its research tools. For short, less involved questions, reference personnel can be reached by a direct telephone line. The phone number for reference assistance is (305) 522-2300, Ext. 115.

The Nova Law Library is now located close to the business center of Fort Lauderdale at 3100 S.W. 9th Avenue. The collection includes over 88,-000 volumes and the library subscribes to 550 legal journals. It is rich in tax materials, international legal documents, and practice tools. We hope these new services will encourage members of the Bar to take advantage of our collection.

YOUNG LAWYERS PRESIDENT'S COLUMN

As the incoming President of the Broward County Young Lawyers Section, I would like to take the opportunity to make some comments about the activities of our section. I am not going to attempt to write one of those long philosophical articles about the value of bar work nor am I going to write an article praising the various members of our section who have made contributions in the past. Instead, I am going to direct my thoughts to this coming year.

Recently, I prepared the agenda for the initial meeting of the Executive Committee of our section. A review of that agenda reveals the projects which are going to be undertaken during this next year. The following is a partial list of those projects and activities:

- 8. YLS Annual Softball Tournament.
- 9. YLS Softball & Football League.
- 10. YLS Media & The Law Committee.
- 11. YLS Luncheon Speakers Committee.

As you can see from the above, there are a variety of both social and community oriented projects.

During this coming year, I would like to initiate a committee of our section to investigate the possibility of starting a credit union for our bar organization. The purpose of this credit union is to serve its members in such ventures as the financing of the purchase of equipment, automobiles, and any other borrowing activities normally and customarily undertaken by lawyers. A similar project in Dade County has been functioning for several years with great success. As an example, the Young Law-

yers in Dade County had the opportunity to borrow funds from that credit union at 10% interest rates for the purpose of purchasing equipment for their offices. I am certain that with a total attorney population in this county of approximately 2,300 lawyers, that there is a great need as well as interest for such a progrma .

Perhaps, the most striking impression I have of reviewing the activities of our section is that these activities are carried out by an Executive Committee which consists of six members plus three officers. In the past, the Executive Committee has had projects undertaken primarily by the members. As an example, the YLS United Way Run which was held on November 1, 1980 was conducted primarily by the members of the section with some assistance from the officers. The result was a tremendous event for our community which had the added benefit of making a substantial contribution to the local United Way campaign. In this coming year. I would like to encourage greater participation by the members of our section in our activities.

Therefore, if you are interested in any of the projects which are listed above, or if you have an idea for a new project which is of interest to our section members, I would appreciate it if you would contact Bob McFann (764-4646, Steve Lauer (565-0501) or myself (473-1500) so that we can have the benefit of your participation. Finally. I would like to encourage your attendance at our monthly luncheon meetings which are held on fourth Thursday of each month. In keeping with our tradition, each luncheon meeting features a speaker of interest. If there are some particular areas of law, or of interest to lawyers in general, I would appreciate it if you would drop me a note suggesting future topics or speakers.

Since I indicated in the opening paragraph of this article that I would not make any philosophical comments, I won't conclude by telling you that the success of these projects depends on the participation of our members.




Young Lawyers Softball League Results

1st Annual Bar/Bench Conference Results

The first Seventeenth Judicial Circuit Bench and Bar Conference was a great success. The conference was held on Saturday, April 25, 1981, at the Bahia Mar Hotel. Forty-one attorneys and twelve judges were in attendance. Discussion groups comprised of attorneys and judges were held during the morning. There were two civil law discussion groups, one criminal group and one domestic relations group. Each group came back to the afternoon secsion with a number of suggested resolutions. The resolutions were discussed in an open forum and voted upon.

The suggestions ranged from the adoption of a uniform motion calendar to be held from 8:45 to 9:30 a.m., Monday through Thursday with a limit of five minutes per side for each case scheduled and a notice of hearing to be delivered to the judge's secretary no later than four working days prior to the date of the hearing; a recommendation that all attorneys' fee affidavits be required to set forth the criteria which the expert considered in reaching his or her opinion to a recommendation that all calendar calls be held on Friday. The resolutions were taken down by a court reporter and transcribed, including some discussion from the floor. A copy of this transcript is available for review at the office of Linda Conahan, English, McCaughan & O'Bryan. The transcript will be furnished to the Court's Committee with copies to the Chief Judge and the President of the Broward County Bar Association for further consideration, and hopefully implementation of some, if not all, of the recommendations.

Those who participated found the conference enjoyable, as well as beneficial. It was rewarding to hear members of the judiciary and the bar discuss issues frankly, openly and with a sincere desire to listen and understand for the benefit of all.

The conference will be held again next year. Any comments and suggestions for improving the format are welcomed.

Court Adopts Jury Instructions Effective July 1

Newly adopted standard jury instructions in criminal and misdeamor cases and grand jury instructions go into effect July 1, according to an order of the Supreme Court issued on April 16.

The court directed The Florida Bar to publish the schedule of lesser included offenses of the standard jury instructions in criminal cases to facilitate comment from the Bar. Commentary should be submitted to the court no later than June 1, 1981.

Subject to modification following commentary received by that date, the court stated it intends to approve the table of lesser offenses for use beginning July 1. It directed the Supreme Court Committee on Standard Jury Instructions in Criminal Cases and the Criminal Procedure Rules Committee of The Florida Bar to jointly submit to the court by June 1 proposed revisions of Rules 3.510 and 3.490 consistent with the table of lesser included offenses and the committee's recommendations.

Until July 1, trial judges are directed to continue to follow the requirements of Brown v. State and current Rules 3.510 and 3.490.

The new standard jury instructions in criminal cases represent a revision of the petit jury instructions in criminal cases adopted in 1970 and amended in 1976. In 1977, the Supreme Court requested the committee to revise and modify the instructions to make them more easily understood by citizen jurors, to consider the approval of instructions and a handbook for a grand jury and to establish a schedule of lesser included offenses.
